

OSPREY SPORTS FALL SWOOP UP

UNF Athletics has been on an upswing since Osprey men's basketball completed their best season ever. Some of the fall teams have followed suit, but here are some of the big stories from this semester that helped keep the swoop relevant.

OSPREY TO COMPETE FOR USA RUGBY LEAGUE WORLD CUP TEAM

UNF Deadbirds rugby center David Aguilar has been selected to play in the 2017 Rugby League World Cup for team USA.



Representing the USA Hawks, Aguilar will miss part of his senior season with the UNF Deadbirds. But Aguilar said missing part of the season is nothing compared to being able to play for and represent his country.

Aguilar is considered one of the top 20 players in the United States.



CROSS COUNTRY OSPREY IS ATLANTIC SUN RUNNER OF THE YEAR

First-year UNF cross country runner Logan Poteet was awarded the Atlantic Sun Runner of the Year and Freshman of the Year after a first-place finish in the Atlantic Sun

Conference Championship 8K race Oct. 30. The Ospreys finished second as a team.

"It's really nice [to win] and I'm excited about it," Poteet said. "But it would've been awesome if the team could've taken it. That was the goal."

OSPREY MEN'S SOCCER CLINCH SHARE OF ATLANTIC SUN REGULAR SEASON TITLE

Led by head coach Derek Marinatos, the men's soccer team had their best season ever this fall. The Ospreys finished 8-6-1 overall and remained



undefeated at 4-0-1 in the Atlantic Sun, good enough for a share of the regular season conference title with Florida Gulf Coast University. This marks the first regular season title for the Osprey footballers.

The Osprey squad also defeated Jacksonville University Oct. 24, marking the first ever back-to-back wins against the Dolphins in series history.



MEN'S BASKETBALL TAKES IT ALI

The Atlantic Sun's fan-voted preseason awards and both the coaches and media polls have given the Osprey men's basketball troop high hopes. Senior Beau Beech earned the fan-voted Atlantic Sun Preseason Player of the Year award and his teammate senior Demarcus Daniels won Atlantic Sun Preseason Defensive Player of the Year.

Beech and Daniels, along with juniors Dallas Moore and Chris Davenport, were selected to the A-Sun's Preseason All-Conference team.

Naturally, the coaches and media preseason polls both had the Ospreys finishing on top of the conference by the end of the year.



COACH DRISCOLL EXTENDS CONTRACT

The Ospreys have kept those pens moving as UNF Athletics signed men's basketball head coach Matthew Driscoll to a four-year contract extension. Driscoll is bound to the Ospreys through 2022.

"Coach Driscoll is very deserving of this contract extension and I am thrilled to have him continue leading our basketball program for many more seasons," Athletic Director Lee Moon said.

Driscoll expressed high hopes for his team entering the 2015–16 season at Osprey basketball media day Nov. 3.

"In my heart, do I feel like we're going to win the Atlantic Sun Championship and go to the NCAA Tournament?" Driscoll asked himself. He answered yes.

Students voted against having concealed firearms on campus with 51 percent of the vote according to the SG general elections results. There were a total of 1,004 votes cast on the plebiscite, with 512 votes cast in opposition to concealed carry. The number of students in support of concealed carry was 386 (38.4 percent) and 106 voted neutral (10.6 percent). According to the UNF Office of Institutional Research and Assessment, the fall 2015 enrollment status is at 15,839 students, with the number of votes cast on the plebiscite equaling approximately 6.3 percent of the student body.

UNF President John Delaney announced the addition of the Hicks Honors College in a press conference held at Osprey Plaza Oct. 15. UNF will become the sixth university in Florida to implement an Honors College on its campus. Ann and David Hicks have pledged a \$7 million donation for the Honors College, one of the largest donations to UNF by alumni. \$180,000 per year will come out of that donation to fund study abroad scholarships for 60 Honors College students. There are about 580 total students in UNF's Honors Program, according to a press release from UNF Director of Public Relations Joanna Norris.

DRUNKEN ESCAPADE AT THE COVE


UNFPD arrested a student Oct. 24 for possession of a Vyvanse pill and underage drinking.

Officers arrived at the scene and found a student sitting on the ground in Osprey Cove. The police report said the student "appeared to be very intoxicated" with bloodshot eyes, slurred speech and a strong odor of alcohol. The student said he was upset about the death of a friend and he drank about half of a bottle of vodka.

The student's backpack was open and in plain view was a Vyvanse prescription bottle prescribed to a female non-UNF student. The student said he was holding the medication for a friend because she left it in the library. There was one 40 mg Vyvanse pill in the bottle.

According to the police report, the student's RA witnessed him pull up a plant from the courtyard and place it in the laundry room. The police report also said the RA saw him hit several doors, and said he became belligerent and verbally abusive, cursing at her and the housing staff.

The student, who is underage, gave UNFPD permission to search his backpack, where they found a 1.75 liter bottle of Skol vodka with a quarter of the contents left. UNFPD arrested the student for possession of a controlled substance without a prescription, which is a third degree felony, and disorderly intoxication. The vodka was disposed of.





WEED BUST: FOUR FELONIES FOR 48 GRAMS

UNFPD responded to a complaint concerning the smell of burning marijuana coming from a dorm room in Osprey Crossings Oct. 19.

When an officer knocked on the door, the suspect answered and the smell of marijuana reportedly grew stronger. According to the police report, the suspect appeared dazed and his speech was mumbled. When questioned, he admitted to lighting up in the room and having weed, too. The police report said the suspect went back into the room with officers watching him, and came back with a small amount of weed cupped in the palm of his hand.

The suspect's roommate appeared to be sleeping. But when woken up, he admitted

he knew about marijuana use in the dorm and told officers he did not partake. UNFPD then requested verbal consent to enter the dorm room, but the suspect denied. However, this did not stop officers from entering the room. The police report states, "Due to the housing contract that every UNF Housing student signs before movein, the officers were authorized to enter the dorm room for 'health and safety' purposes, along with probable cause."

UNFPD searched the room and found 48 grams of marijuana, hash oil, four bongs with residue, a metal grinder with residue and a butane torch. They also found a gas mask bong with residue, 23 dime bags commonly used to sell drugs, and several

containers with weed residue. Two large bags of weed were found in the suspect's top and bottom desk drawers. The police report also states the smoke detector was covered with a plastic bag.

After UNFPD read the suspect his Miranda rights, they claimed possession of the illegal items found in his drawers. The officers then questioned the suspect's roommate who said he knew drugs were being used and sold within the room.

UNFPD then arrested the suspect and brought him to the Duval County Pretrial Detention Facility for booking. He currently faces four felony charges and one misdemeanor charge.

AND THAT'S WHY YOU ALWAYS LOCK YOUR DOORS

A series of 11 car burglaries occurred Sept. 20 in The Flats at UNF. According to the police reports, the suspect entered the vehicles through unlocked doors. The cars burglarized were parked near apartment buildings three, four, five, and eight.

In one car, the suspect sprayed red hair dye on the passenger seat and set an envelope on fire inside the vehicle. In every incident, glove boxes were left open and center consoles were reportedly rummaged through.

"I feel violated by this incident," said Elizabeth Cagle, a sophomore majoring in biology who numbers among the victims. "I feel unsure about the safety of The Flats."

Items reported stolen include a MacBook Pro, Cobra Radar detector, a black Sony camera with a case and a black replica BB pistol.

"We all need to make sure we're doing the things that make campus as safe as we can," said UNF Police Chief Frank Mackesy in an interview with *Spinnaker*. "One of those is as simple as locking a car door."

There are currently no suspects or witnesses, and patrol efforts have been suspended.

GRAND THEFT AUTO NORTH FLORIDA

UNFPD dispatched an officer to the UNF Arena parking garage after a student reported her car was stolen around 10:52 p.m. Sept. 5.

According to the police report, the student said she parked her car in the garage between 8:30 p.m. and 9 p.m., returned to place some items in her vehicle and then left again. The student said her hands were full when she locked her vehicle, and either left her keys in the car door or dropped them in the area.

The student's car, a white 2000 Toyota 4Runner, contained a red and white striped bag with a laptop, a blue duffel bag containing clothes and a Rack Room Shoes bag with shoes in it at the time it was stolen.

UNFPD searched the surrounding area and parking lots, but did not find the keys or the victim's car. There were no witnesses or suspects at the time of the report.

SIX PARKING DECALS VANISH

A wave of parking decal thefts swept across campus between Sept. 1 and Sept. 23, with six separate crimes reported.

A student returned to her car in Lot 5, next to the Student Wellness Complex, after working out Sept. 1 to find her parking decal was missing. She didn't report the incident until Sept. 10.

A second student's decal was reported stolen in Lot 11 next to the Osprey Cove parking lot. The student said she left her car parked between Sept. 7 and Sept. 10. Upon her return, the student realized her decal was gone and Parking Services had given her two citations.

A third decal was stolen from a car parked on the Fine Arts Parking Garage's second level Sept 10. According to the police report, the student parked his car there in the morning and returned in the afternoon to find his decal had been forcibly removed.

A UNF student returned to her car in Lot 11 by Osprey Cove Sept. 9 and found her parking decal was missing. This is the second reported decal stolen from the Osprey Cove parking lot.

In the fifth case reported in September, a student returned to his car in Lot 5 on Sept. 14 to find his parking decal was missing. The victim said he placed the 2015-16 decal over previous years' decals, and the suspect peeled the current decal off of the old ones. This is _ the second parking decal stolen from Lot 5.

A student returned to her car in Lot 2, in front of the Thomas G. Carpenter Library, and discovered someone stole her parking decal, according to UNFPD. Sometime between Sept. 22 and Sept. 23, the decal went missing. During that time, parking services issued the victim a parking ticket.

It is unclear whether all reported stolen decals are related to each other. The cases have not been cleared, but patrol efforts have been suspended.

2014–15 SEASON RECAP

The Ospreys come off of their first ever NCAA Tournament appearance at the First Four where Matthew Driscoll's squad lost to Robert Morris 81-77. This season, the Ospreys are near-unanimous picks to retain the A-Sun Championship from the coaches and media polls. Four Ospreys were named to the A-Sun preseason team. Beau Beech was named the

preseason A-Sun Player of the Year and Demarcus Daniels is as Defensive Player of the Year. Although forward Romelo Banks' ankle surgery will delay his season 6 weeks, point guard Dallas Moore and power forward Chris Davenport pack a formidable punch. Last year's team was the best ever, and the expectations for the upcoming season are enormous.

The Ospreys kick-off their season in Champaign, Illinois against a patchwork Fighting Illini squad. The Illini will miss 6'11" center Nnanna Egwu and leading scorer Rayvonte Rice (16.5 ppg). Add to that, guard Tracey Adams will miss the entire season to a knee injury and junior power forward Darius Paul was suspended indefinitely after getting arrested on a team trip to France. Playing a smaller lineup, guards Hill and Nunn, as well as four-star recruit Jalen Coleman-Lands will have to shoulder the load as the pressure builds on fourth-year head coach John Groce.

We really don't know what the Ospreys are going to get with Louisville, as the Cardinals enter the season in a shroud of uncertainty. Coach Rick Pitino has yet to answer allegations that school aides provided strippers for players and recruits. The 2013 NCAA Champions lost four starters- 58.1 points per game worth of starters. Point guard Terry Rozier (sixteenth overall, Celtics) and power forward Montrezl Harrell (thirtysecond overall, Rockets) left for the NBA. Senior guard Chris Jones was dismissed from the team because of rape charges and small forward Wayne Blackshear graduated. But Pitino has to be optimistic with Drexel transfer Damion Lee, who sat out last season, along with prized recruit Deng Adel. Now, 6'10" centers Chinanu Onuaku and Mangok Mathiang will have to carry the frontcourt.

LSU is another team that lost talent to the NBA this year: forwards Jarell Martin (twenty-fifth, Grizzlies) and Jordan Mickey (thirty-third, Celtics) but hopes are high in Baton Rouge after last year's early tournament exit. Fourthyear coach Johnny Jones' team is guard heavy, with returning stalwarts like Keith Hornsby and Tim Quarterman. According to ESPN, The Tigers are bolstered by the third-best recruit class with five-star guards Antonio Blankeney and Brandon Sampson, Louisiana's "Mr. Basketball." Jones also secured the best recruit in the nation with Australian power forward Ben Simmons, touted by some as the 2016 NBA no.1 overall pick.

The Flyers notably started last season with six eligible players and a whopping zero players taller than 6'6". And they didn't do so bad, winning a First Four game against Boise State at home and knocking off sixthseeded Providence. Senior Dyshawn Pierre will likely miss the tilt with the Ospreys due to a pending sexual assault charge.



FALL-INSPIRED FARE FOR THE HOLIDAYS

IT'S FALL. WE LOVE IT. WE'RE NOT SORRY ABOUT IT.

The air is more refreshing, leaves are changing colors and it's okay to mutilate orange gourds for decoration. Autumn lovers seem to get hate these days for outwardly professing their seasonal love for pumpkin spice. But October enthusiasts should retaliate and impress their friends with fall-inspired foods.



BAKED PUMPKIN FRENCH TOAST

Here's an unconventional way to make French toast in autumn. The pumpkin puree is strong, so if you're not a big fan of .5it, use slightly less than the directions say. This recipe makes about four servings.

INGREDIENTS

- 4 eggs
- ½ teaspoons vanilla extract
- 1 and ¼ teaspoons ground cinnamon
- ¼ teaspoon ground cloves
- ¼ teaspoon ground nutmeg
- ½tablespoon white sugar
- 7½ ounces of pumpkin puree
- 1 loaf Texas toast, cut into 1-inch cubes
- 1/3 cup brown sugar
- 1 tablespoon all-purpose flour
- 1 tablespoon softened butter

PREP

- Preheat oven to 350 degrees Fahrenheit, then grease a small baking dish. Mine was 9-by-13 inches.
- Whisk eggs, vanilla extract, 1 teaspoon of cinnamon, the cloves, nutmeg and white sugar in a bowl, then add the pumpkin and mix. Beat in the pumpkin until it's fully incorporated.
- Put the diced bread in the baking dish, add the pumpkin mix from step two and toss the bread in it.
- Stir ½ cup brown sugar, ¼ teaspoon cinnamon, flour, and butter together in another small bowl until you can sprinkle it easily over the bread.
- Bake in oven for 30-40 minutes.

APPLE CHEESECAKE

This cake reminds me of apple pie, but is unmistakably a delicious cheesecake. The apple element turns soft in the oven and locks in the cinnamon perfectly. This recipe makes for about eight slices.

INGREDIENTS

- 1 cup graham cracker crumbs
- \bullet ½ cup finely-chopped pecans
- ullet 3 tablespoons white sugar
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- \bullet ¼ cup unsalted butter, melted
- 2, 8 ounce packages of softened cream cheese
- ½ cup white sugar
- 2 eggs
- ½ teaspoons vanilla extract
- 4 apples, peeled, cut and thinly sliced
- 1/3 cup white sugar
- 1/4 cup chopped pecans for garnish

PRFP

- Preheat oven to 350 degrees Fahrenheit.
- Mix the graham cracker crumbs, ½ cup finely chopped pecans, 3 tablespoons of sugar, ½ teaspoon of cinnamon and melted butter in a large bowl. Press into the bottom of a 9-by-9 inch baking dish.
- Bake in the oven for 10 minutes.
- Mix cream cheese, eggs, vanilla extract and ½ cup of sugar in a large bowl, and use a hand mixer at medium speed until it's smooth. Pour this into the baked crust.
- Stir the ½ cup of sugar and ½ teaspoon cinnamon in a small bowl. Sprinkle and toss the cinnamon and sugar with the apples to coat them. Lay the apple mixture over the cream cheese layer and top with ½ cup of chopped pecans.
- Bake for 60-70 minutes, and let the cake chill for a bit before serving.

CRANBERRY NUT GRANOLA BARS

These bars are awesome on-the-go breakfasts when heading to class in a hurry. They are also the perfect accompaniment to a crisp winter morning. This recipe makes about 10 bars.



INGREDIENTS

- 2 cups quick-cooking oats
- 1 cup old-fashioned oats
- ½ cup hulled pumpkin seeds, also called pepitas
- ½ cup slivered almonds
- 1 cup mixed nuts
- 1 cup dried cranberries
- 1, 14-ounce can sweetened condensed milk

PRFP

- Preheat oven to 350 degrees Fahrenheit and line baking sheet with parchment paper.
- Mix everything into a bowl and spread around the pan.
- Bake for 20-25 minutes, or until golden brown. Let them cool and cut them into bars!

APPLE CIDER FROM SCRATCH

This is the perfect recipe for quality homemade cider. My batch was sweet and felt nice in my favorite mug. It can also be served cold! Use this recipe to make a half-gallon of cider.



INGREDIENTS

- 8 Gala apples
- 1 cup white sugar
- 4 tablespoons of cinnamon, or 4 cinnamon sticks
- 4 tablespoons allspice

PRFF

- Cut the apples into quarters. No need to peel or remove seeds.
- Load apples into a large pot and add just enough water to cover them.
- Add sugar, cinnamon and allspice.
- Boil the apples in an uncovered pot at high heat for one hour.
- After one hour, turn heat down to medium and let simmer for two more hours.
- After two hours, mash the apples up. A potato masher will do the trick.
- Strain the apple cider into a large bowl with a small-holed colander.
- Enjoy, freeze or reheat in the microwave.



In a room full of chalk-white pieces with blue-black figures and landscapes, "Lucida" is the visual result of a man creating empathy based on experience. The Lufrano Intercultural Gallery hosts pieces created by Franklin Matthews, a police officer and artist at heart, until Dec. 11.

"The natural thing for people to do when they see someone in pain is to feel bad for them," Matthews said. "But the problem with sympathy is that it becomes pity, and that can become rage or disgust."

Matthews said two primary causes led to the creation of his works. First, there was the stress from his job as police officer. "A lot has been said on the war on drugs," he said. "I can't comment on that. I don't think I take part in that as much as I take part in a battle against the problem that drugs cause."

As a police officer,
Matthews said he's witnessed
the effects of addiction on
people he interacted with
during patrol. Coming
from a Christian, "defined"
household, Matthews
said the behaviors these
people showed were
tough to experience.

The stress then spilled into his home life when Matthews' son died of heroin overdose.

"It kidnapped my life," said Matthews. "I had to deal with the horrible consequences at work, and then I go home where there's no peace there either. On one side, I'm trying to push against the wall, while on the other side there's an eagle trying to take one of my litter."

In an effort to move away from the anger, Matthews said he turned to art to transform sympathy into empathy. He wanted to understand the life-consuming qualities of addiction.

The creative process helps him to understand the destructive cycle of addiction. Matthews said he finds peace through his artistic endeavors, and allows audiences to see his thoughts emerge from the canvas.

"The Grey King" depicts a man who had a drug addiction, and was Matthews' first step toward coping with his frustration.

The largest piece, "Untitled," is as tall as the wall and its canvas trails outward on the floor. It is a long curtain with a charcoaled profile sketch of an African American man with an indifferent expression.

Arrows puncture his body.

Matthews created the giant piece as a second version of the painting

hung beside it. He said it represents the destructive cycle of addiction, and how it brings temporary peace.

"The larger piece,"
Matthews said, "was an apology for the first piece."
He said he didn't want the figure in the smaller version to appear pathetic, so the larger version serves as an allegory for prayer.

Matthews also said he is most emotionally connected to his painting titled "The Prodigal Son." He said it originally started as a representation of the Prodigal Son, but then the image shifted to refer to Jacob wrestling with the angel.

In the biblical story, Jacob betrays his brother and waits for him one night, while also wrestling with an angel. Jacob then realizes he cannot defeat the supernatural being, but continues to persevere. The angel dislocates Jacob's hip, but Jacob eventually wins the battle. Matthews painted his interpretation of the fight by trying to express the blessing of perseverance.

ADMINS vs. PROFESSORS

WHY UNF HAS MORE PROFESSORS THAN ADMINISTRATORS

When you walk into the president's office, the lights are dim ...





our feet sink in its luxurious carpet and you're asked to sit on a plush leather sofa while you wait. Your eyes catch the artwork hanging in heavy frames, shiny desks made of dark wood and it may leave you wondering where this place came from.

Compared to most professors' small offices with paint-chipped walls and uncomfortable looking chairs, the president's office in J. J. Daniel Hall could belong to a a college. different campus.

With growing concern that colleges are run more like luxury resorts, according to a New York Times article, or businesses, according to the Guardian, than educational institutions, schools across the country are coming under scrutiny for all kinds of questionable decisions. This, in addition to students struggling with debt may lead them to question their university's priorities.

One priority to consider is the ratio of management positions - vice presidents and other executives - to teaching positions at

But according to data by the U.S. Department of Education's National Center for Education Statistics, public universities in Florida tend to have more instructional

staff than management. UNF in particular had 768 instructional staff members in fall 2013, and only 313 people in management.

Take, for example, Vice President and Chief of Staff Dr. Thomas Serwatka. He's been with UNF for 40 years, as a professor for 32 years and an administrator for 18, some years serving as both.

"I'm not surprised that there's that sort of balance based on the fact that obviously the centerpiece of what we're doing is providing education," Serwatka said. "We should be putting our dollars, as many as possible, into the classroom."

Administrators are here to give resources so that professors can work with students.



Serwatka credits professors with creating a better quality education, and cites UNF's small class sizes as something that helps foster connections between faculty and students.

"You don't need administrators at the same ratio, by any means, as you have faculty. It's clear that faculty operate and run the university, and are in charge of the curriculum, and are in charge of providing the quality of the education the students are getting," Serwatka said.

Students name education as the primary purpose of college as well.

"They go hand in hand," English junior Madison Barrow said of professors and administrators. "You obviously need the professors, but you obviously need the behind the scenes kind of thing. So I don't think that you can't have one and not the other."

No matter the numbers of administrators, Serwatka said in a university, professors are the most important.

"Administrators are here to give resources so that professors can work with students,"

Serwatka said he still remembers his time in school when a professor made a difference in his life. He was struggling with statistics, but thanks to his professor, his distaste for math became seven math classes with the same professor and turned him into a tutor for other students.


"And it wasn't an administrator that made that happen," Serwatka said.

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UNINTENTIONAL INJURY:

THE LEADING CAUSE OF COLLEGE AGED STUDENT DEATHS

he leading cause of death for people ages 15-24 and 25-34 is unintentional injury, a category that includes things like motor vehicle accidents, drownings, poisonings and falls, according to 2013 data from the Centers for Disease Control. Suicide and homicide are the second and third leading causes of death for both age groups.

In the past few years, several UNF students have died from these causes. Garth Sangree, a mechanical engineering sophomore, died earlier this year from an accidental drowning, according to officials. In April, sophomore accounting major John C. Leone died from serious bodily injury after a hit-and-run traffic accident.

UNF has also recently seen deaths from suicide and homicide. Abraham Noel, a communications junior, died by suicide in April 2014. And on Aug. 28, UNF senior

Nicholas Hare died from gunshot wounds in a homicide attempted suicide.

According to Dr. Julie Merten, associate professor and internship director in the Department of Public Health at UNF, despite the fact that the CDC uses broad categories such as unintentional injury to identify causes of death, the most common can be narrowed for college students.

"It depends on the source that you look at, but it's pretty consistent with the top three," Merten said of students' most common cause of death. "You'll see traffic accidents, and about half of those are related to alcohol, you'll see suicide and then you'll see other alcohol-related instances, and that would be something like overindulging accidents."

While these are the most common causes of death for students, their deaths do not account for a significant amount of the deaths in the U.S. According to the CDC,

people ages 15-29 who died in 2013 account for 1.9 percent of the total number of deaths in 2013.

Merten conducts a health behavior study annually at UNF. She said the study has found some alarming information about students' health outside of causes of death.

Merten said they are seeing a lot of problems with lack of physical activity and poor nutrition, which is leading to increased BMIs, as well as increasing levels of stress among students.

"You've got a lot to manage as a college student," Merten said. "You've got classes, a lot of students are working full time, taking care of families, parents. We have a lot of people who have children, and they're managing families as well. So we are seeing stress pop up on our survey."

Merten explains that one question on the survey, while it is not intended to act as a

diagnosis of depression, asks students if they have experienced feelings of hopelessness for two consecutive weeks over the past year. Merten said based on responses at UNF, it looks like about 40-45 percent of students are indicating they feel that way.

This number has increased over the past few years. In 2011, 30 percent answered yes to the above question; in 2012, 32 percent did; and in 2013, 35 percent of students surveyed answered yes.

Additionally, Merten said the UNF survey supports the high number of traffic fatalities seen by college students.

"One of the more alarming findings was the texting while driving, and we've found that between 30 to 40 percent of students are texting while the vehicle is in motion," Merten said.

KENDRICK LAMAR// TO PIMP A BUTTERFLY



I have only listened to this album once, but even that was enough to know that Kendrick Lamar has built a masterpiece. Synthesizing an entire culture's musical legacy into a single album, *To Pimp a Butterfly* is a dense, sprawling depiction of what it means to be black in America. It is possibly the most ambitious concept album hip-hop has produced yet—an epic work of literature that we will spend decades analyzing. It's not often we are greeted with a true instant classic, but that's exactly what Kendrick gave usthis year.

Mourn plays with the ferocity of an early PJ Harvey and writes with the irreverence of Bikini Kill. VIET CONG// "BUNKER BUSTER"

The lyrics are deliberately mysterious – something about "muted lips on Japanese hips" – and don't distract from the muscular, crunching, off-kilter central riff. This is at its purest: it's tough, it's cool and it knows exactly what it's doing.

The Baltimore dream-poppers gave themselves a chance to try something different on Depression Cherry, and they didn't take it. 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ATTACK ON TITAN: PART I BLOOD, GUTS AND RIDICULOUS ROMANCE



enduring creative and commercial failures like Dragonball Evolution and The Last Airbender. fans need to accept the truth — anime and manga don't thrive beyond their twodimensional domain. Viewing live action anime adaptations is all about curiosity: for how gravity-defying hairstyles will be interpreted on screen, for how intact the plot will remain and for how bad — or so bad it's good — the film will be. So arrive to see director Shinji Higuchi's Attack on Titan: Part 1 without any expectations. Forget everything you know, and prepare for fan fiction brought to life on a budget.

The film takes place in a society completely enclosed within protective walls defended by the military. For the past 100 years, the walls have ensured peace for the citizens, diminishing the belief that monstrous enemies known as titans actually exist. Feisty protagonist Eren, along with best friends Armin and Mikasa, decide to explore the outer wall's perimeter, imagining life outside the fortification. In the midst of the trio getting caught in a fistfight with authorities, a sudden tremor brings everyone to a standstill shock as they witness a colossal titan puncturing a hole into the wall. After the fall, Eren is convinced he left Mikasa defenseless against the titans. To avenge his girlfriend's assumed death, he joins the military cadets two years later with a noworphaned Armin.

The romance in the film does nothing more than give coed combat a bad name. Injecting drama between the sexes into such a dark series not only detracts from the gravity of the situation, but also robs Mikasa of her role as a badass female. In the source material, Mikasa and Eren's relationship is given a familial slant. The two are like brother and sister, and sexual undertones



offers a selfish, chauvinistic motive for Eren to accept the call to action. In fact, everyone in the military seems to pair up. Even Armin DON'T THRIVE BEYOND THEIR TWO-DIMENSIONAL

The slime, viscera and even an inside look at Eren riding down a titan's digestive tract are what should compel fans to check the film out. With brand new potential story arcs, Godzilla-style thrill, and laughable caricatures of beloved characters, Attack on Titan: Part 1 is a definite must-see to enhance the original series' greatness and equip fans with new inside jokes, even if it's not great. It's about perspective, and Higuchi offers an alternative view that fans might forgive in exchange for more and

STEVE JOBS

A REINVIGORATING BIOPIC THE TECH ICON DESERVES

iopics have two problems — they cram information to an overstuffed slog or they romanticize the subject. Steve Jobs does neither. There are moments in Steve Jobs where everything clicks. Director Danny Boyle interpolates flashbacks to transition from era to era without morphing into a series of stale montages. Boyle's kinetic style of filmmaking and screenwriter Aaron Sorkin's rapid-fire dialogue achieve a near-perfect symbiosis in the film.

Steve Jobs is an unconventional biopic, but it isn't nonlinear. We follow Jobs through




three instances where he was the most comfortable: product launches. First, Flint Hall for the launch of the Macintosh in 1984. Second, at the San Francisco Opera House at the launch of NeXT computers in 1988 after Jobs was fired from Apple. Lastly, a rehired Jobs unveils the iMac, kick starting the reinvigoration of Apple in 1998. The time frame of Steve Jobs is underwhelming on the surface because of how misleading it is. Obviously, Jobs didn't hash out all his personal issues and business scores ten minutes before presenting his products This might be the most fictitious biopic ever made.

Prior to each launch, Jobs has intimate and engaging encounters with Apple CEO John Sculley (Jeff Daniels), Apple cofounder Steve Wozniak (Seth Rogen), and marketing director Joanna Hoffman (Kate Winslet, in her best performance since The Reader). Rogen and Daniels shine with just the right amount of bitterness and admiration, but Winslet steals the show as Jobs' concerned confidant — there's a scene where she breaks down and practically begs Jobs to acknowledge his daughter Lisa. Steve Jobs has other strong female roles: Katherine Waterston plays Lisa's weary mother Chrisann Brennan and Ripley Sobo, Perla Haney-Jardine and Mackenzie Moss have short, moving parts as Lisa Brennan-Jobs.

Throughout Steve Jobs, we see and hear about many of Jobs' heroes like Einstein, Dylan, Lennon, Da Vinci, Picasso, Napoleon, and Caesar. Instead of making a comparison, Boyle and Sorkin convey how Jobs saw himself — as a man whose products made a "dent in the universe." Their attempt to capture the apotheosis of Jobs' "reality distortion field" is ambitious, unusual, and probably one of the best films of the year.
